## The Way of Salvation in the Lutheran Church by Pastor George Gerberding (1887) Notes on Chapter 21—Justification

Justification is an act of God, by which He accounts or adjudges a person righteous in His sight. The origin or source of justification is God's love (John 3:16). Because of man's sin and guilt, there must be punishment and suffering. Christ came to be the guilty One and take all sins upon Himself, and to fulfill God's Law perfectly and completely.

Justification . . .

- 1. is the chief doctrine of the Scriptures
- 2. is the doctrine of a standing or falling church
- 3. does not change the person's nature
- 4. does change the person's standing or relation to God
- 5. comes because of God's gift of His righteousness

"Comfort, comfort My people," says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that her warfare is ended, that her iniquity is pardoned, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins (Isaiah 40:1-2).



taking away forgiveness and pardon by Christ's passive obedience

adding to bestowal of standing and place by Christ's active obedience

These are received by God's gift of faith and the person is justified.

The comfort of this study is not in experiencing the grand scheme that is brought to light, but in the personal experience that you know your sins are forgiven and you are a child of God.

## Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ (Romans 5:1).

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
